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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

SNBP College of Arts Commerce Science and Management Studies, Morwadi Pimpri was established in 2008 with the vision “To Contribute Towards Creating Centre of Educational Excellence in Computer, Commerce, Science, Arts and Management Field To Serve As A Valuable Resource For Industry and Remain A Source of Pride For All Indians.” SNBPACS, Morwadi runs the Undergraduate as well as Post Graduate Courses. Under the UG Level - BA, BCom, BSc., BSc (CS), BBA, & BBA (CA) courses offered with the affiliation of Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune. All undergraduate courses are 3 years Degree Programmes on regular basis.

The College is exactly located in the heart of Pimpri Chinchwad area. The College Library is well equipped with variety of Books, Magazines, Journals, Periodicals related to Students, Subject and Currents affairs. College has well equipped Computer Lab with modern technology. The college provides opportunities to students in sports with all sports equipment's and facilities.

SNBPACS conducts various supportive Curricular activities – Guest Lectures and workshop on various academic related themes, Personality Development Programmes, Quiz & other Competitions, Industrial Visits, Contest & Games. College organizes every year Extra-Curricular, Social, Sports activities - the Voting Awareness Camp, Medical Checkup & Blood Donation Camp, NSS Camp, Swachta Abhiyan, Nirnbhay Kannya (Self Defense) Abhiyan, Trekking Mohim, Painting Competition, University Tournaments, National Hockey Tournament, Sporto-Cultural Carnival with vigor to make students train in all fields and through this they get in touch with society, experience it practically which help them for their overall development. College has a tie-up with the industry. So many students go under various Internship Programme every year through tie-up. College organizes Placement Interviews for the students every year.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The institute runs UG courses of SPPU University, Pune with good academic flexibility. The college is offering 06 under graduate programmes follow the CBCS/elective curriculum. All the courses are unaided. The curriculum is designed by the University. The college ensure effective curriculum delivery through a well-planned process. The college adheres to academic calendar. The head of the department monitors the completion of curriculum by every faculty member of the department. College runs certificate courses in computer for the skill enhancement of the students. The faculties have representation in syllabus revision committees. The College collaborates with industries and external agencies for consultancy and internship, small projects for the students. The volunteers from NSS and students from Earn & Learn scheme also contribute to make campus plastic free. Activities of Nirbhaya Kanya Abhiyan sensitize the students towards gender issues. Celebration of Youth Week, Science Day and National Festivals help to inculcate values among the students. Study tours and visits and field projects are conducted to enrich students' knowledge and skills. College collects feedback from all stakeholders on curriculum, teaching and learning. The feedback is analyzed and used for qualitative development of the college.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The institution has transparent admission process catering to students from diverse backgrounds and geographies, many from economically disadvantaged sections of society, first generation learners and sports achievers. It ensures equity and adheres to rules of the governing authorities for admission process. After admission, the college assesses the learning levels of the students through a diagnostic test and identifies advanced and slow learners. The students are informed about aims and objectives of the syllabi and the teaching and evaluation methodologies to be implemented well in advance. Advanced learners are provided with online courses and to participate in conference, Seminars and competitions. For slow learners, special guidance scheme, remedial coaching, personal counseling and extra lectures are conducted. The student-teacher ratio is 32:1. Necessary facilities like ramp, lifts and wheel chair are provided to the Disabilities. Various student-centric learning methods and tools such as field projects, on-the-job training, survey method, role-playing various academic software, ICT enabled classrooms etc. for enhancing teaching-learning processes. Field surveys, industrial visits, study tours and visits to various industries, projects and training are organized to facilitate experiential learning. Guest lectures of expertise faculties are regularly organized. The students are encouraged to participate in state and national seminars and conferences. Students' seminars, group discussion and workshops are organized for participative learning. Problem solving methods are concretely implemented in teaching. ICT and research-based teaching techniques are used in teaching. The Management appoints qualified and full-time teachers. Examination committee ensures smooth conduct of examinations and redressal of exam-related grievances. The faculties participate in workshops on syllabus revision. Institute adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE. Course objectives and outcomes, programme outcomes and programme specific outcomes are formulated by the University. Learning outcomes are assessed through exam results.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- College Research Committee promotes and monitors progress of research work.
- 04 teachers are recognized as research guides by the University and 8 scholars have completed Ph.D. under their guidance. The faculty have published 104 research papers in UGC notified journals, 108 research papers in conferences/seminars/workshops proceedings and 4 books/chapters in various reputed publications.
- 40 papers have been published in UGC approved journals with 05 books with ISBN numbers, 03 chapters' contributions and 16 conference proceedings published during last five years.
- NSS, NCC, Arts and Commerce Departments conduct wide range of extension activities. An average of 6.2 activities was organized.
- Annually to address issues of Gender, Environment, Save Girl Child, Water Conservation, Blood Donation, Tree Plantation, Cleanliness, National Voter's Day Celebration, Voter's Awareness Rally, Tax Paying Awareness, Women Health check-up camp etc.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has state of art infrastructure and learning resources which includes ICT enabled classrooms, seminar halls, well equipped science laboratories, computer laboratories, and other support facilities. The Central Instrumentation Facility (CIF) with sophisticated instruments are available in the college. The infrastructure for Badminton, Basketball, Volleyball, Kabaddi, Wrestling and Yoga is availed. The College regularly organizes intercollegiate and intergroup sports tournaments. The library is semi-automated with Integrated Library Management System and is enriched with references, textbooks, journals and magazines of all disciplines and subjects. The Budget for infrastructure, library and other learning resources is allocated annually based on the recommendations of committees constituted for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities and its improvement. The College ensures optimum utilization of resources. Technical and support staff is appointed which monitors the overall functioning of ICT resources. Licensed copies of software's and antivirus are purchased. Uninterrupted electricity supply is ensured in the campus with the help of Gen set and inverters and UPS systems. The college maintains a satisfactory student computer ratio 18:1 with 10 Mbps bandwidth internet connection and 24-hour campus Wi-Fi facility. The licensed copies of software's are preferred and used for office purposes. RO drinking water facility is made available in the college building to ensure the health of the students. There is also a canteen in the college premises, providing hygienic breakfast, vegetarian lunch, coffee, tea, snacks and refreshments. The college has defined policies for the maintenance of physical and academic support facilities. Maintenance of computers, laboratories, library, classrooms and sports complex is done by nonteaching staff and students of Earn and Learn Scheme and experts hired under maintenance schemes. Also, college is associated with different vendors/ firms for maintaining physical, academic and support facilities as per Annual Maintenance Contracts. The Management recruits the support staff for repairing and other types of work.

Student Support and Progression

- Various types of scholarships, free ships are timely distributed to SCs/STs/OBCs and others. Support services include government scholarships, scholarships from SPPU, Pune and financial aids from the private institution and earn and learn scheme.
- College has instituted a unique imitative in discount scheme- for the students in fee as an aid to needy and poor students for continuation of education.
- Over all passing percentage is praiseworthy with 66.66%.
- College encourages entrepreneurial skills through 03 Certificate Courses and a substantial number of

students were placed through on and off campus drives.

- The college has outstanding performance in extension, social outreach activities and in sports. Cultural Department has shown exemplary performance in various competitions.
- The Alumni Association is functional. Meetings of Alumni Association are regularly conducted. Students have been given representation in curricular and cocurricular committees and associations such as NSS, Library Committee and Sporto-Cultural Carnival.
- Our performance in sports is peaking with higher participation of students in university, state level participation. Our college team has won Winner trophy in Hockey Intern Collegiate. Nine students have participated in national level and two students have participated in three international sports events.
- During the assessment period total 84 students have been placed in different sectors. Nine students have participated in national level and One student have participated in Khelo India.
- The Examination Cell conducts examinations at the college level. Soft Skills, development, Placement support training programme is conducted every year.
- The Students' Council is constituted as per the rules and regulations laid down by SPPU, Pune. Students were encouraged to participate in Young Inspirators' Network programme of Sakal Newspaper Group.
- Our college publish a magazine Aspire to highlight curricular, cocurricular and extracurricular achievements of college, creative art, and encourage students to publish articles in college magazine.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The mission of the college is relevant with the national policies of higher education and is based on education as a means of overall socio-economic and educational development. The college attains the mission through the conduction of programs and activities such as NSS, Women Empowerment, Health Awareness, Soft Skills Development Program and Social Activities and Sports. Governance is decentralized with three bodies i) Management Committee (Apex Body) ii) College Development Committee (Coordinating Committee) and iii) Internal Quality Assurance Cell (Implementation and Inspection Committee) The functions of all the bodies are performed adhering to the rules and regulations enforced by the Government of Maharashtra and other apex regulatory bodies. Due representation is given to the teaching and non-teaching staff in the all the Committees. Committees are appointed to ensure smooth conduct of curricular, Cocurricular and extracurricular activities. Students are also given representation in such committees. Students' Council helps in maintaining rapport and coordination between teachers and students. The management provides state of art infrastructure for academic and research activities and sports. IQAC of the college is functional and takes initiative in organization of academic and research activities. It focuses on conduction of FDP and SDP like workshops, Seminars, presentations. It pays full attention towards the planning and implementation of the overall programme for the academic year.

Transparency is maintained in the overall administration. Library is semi digitalized. The library has digital books, Magazines. The college has purchased licensed software. College Maintenance department looks after the maintenance of infrastructural facilities of college library.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

<p>1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:</p>	<p>In order to develop the all-round capacities of the students – intellectual, aesthetic, social, physical, emotional and moral in an integrated manner, the college is preparing to include multidisciplinary subjects as per the National Educational Policy 2020. As per NEP, our college has Arts, Commerce and Science - multidisciplinary programs affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University (SPPU), Pune. A new CBCS (Choice Based Credit System) is introduced in 2019. CBCS uses a credit-based grading system and not a percentage-wise system. In CBCS system, the student gets Academic Flexibility to opt for credits and courses in different departments. The system allows students to select the</p>
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	<p>subject as per their interest. The college will run academic programs which are truly multidisciplinary, where students from any stream can take admission and obtain a graduation. Arts and Humanities stream has diversified options of multidisciplinary learning. This enables the eligibility for students from any stream to seek admission and complete the academic education. Our college trains students with Add-on courses, Value added courses & various interdisciplinary courses like Courses in Human Rights, Cyber Law, Environmental Awareness, Democracy Governance & Election etc. Student Development Cell responsibly takes care of up-skilling the students of various streams. These are initiative of our college. Few of these courses support the academic degree of students & Employability Enhancement Training. As the College is preparing itself to have more of multi-disciplinary subjects it tries to identify the programme learning outcomes along with courses and unit learning outcomes that define the specific knowledge, skills, attitudes and values that are to be acquired by the learner and would ensure that each programme achieves its goal.</p>
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	<p>Regarding the implementation of Academic Bank of Credits, the institution has to wait for the academic council to give a green signal. The parent university SPPU has already mandated the registration of ABC for all students w.e.f. AY 2022-2023. The institute has already implemented for the current academic year with registration of all students. The pedagogical approach of the institution is student's centric where the faculties' pedagogical approaches are constructive, inquiry-based, reflective, collaborative and integrative. Summative and Formative assessments and assignments are used to evaluate the Students learning outcome. As per the guidelines of NEP, we follow the academic credit system as available from our affiliating University SPPU, Pune. In this system a student has to earn 132 compulsory credits from academic subjects and 8 additional credits for the successful completion of respective graduation degree. These 8 additional credits have to be earned by taking/participating/conducting various activities for the the fulfillment of the degree.</p>
3. Skill development:	<p>The new NEP is based on four pillars which are Access, Equity, Quality, and Accountability. At our institute we have the best environment for the</p>

	<p>implementation of the NEP. NSS program is the best example. The students are trained in a rational way for the life skills which they practice during the activities and residential camps in remote villages. Our college has set up a dedicated cell for Skill Development. The cell takes care of various trainings' which incorporate diversified skills in the students for facing the competitive exams and interviews. The motive of the college is promoting Value-Based Quality Education, hence the college takes efforts to inculcate positivity among the learners. Observing various programmes like World Aids Day, Environment Day, observing the Death and Birth Anniversary of our National leaders which help in imbibing the good qualities of the students. Mentoring students is also one of the practices of the institution, to enable students to explore future employment pathways after graduation, and help them get the most of their studies.</p>
<p>4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):</p>	<p>Our institute from the time of inception has been into integration of the interdisciplinary aspects of Indian knowledge systems into the day to day routine. All types of Linguistic competitions are organized by the Cultural Committee and various departments to inculcate the culture of Indian Linguistic traditions and make them understand the relevance of Indian languages. Regarding the adoption of Indian languages, the college offers various Indian languages like Marathi, Hindi and other optional languages as subjects in degree courses.</p>
<p>5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):</p>	<p>We follow the curriculum syllabi as advised by our affiliating university SPPU, Pune. For every program, there is Program Outcome (PO) along with a Program Specific Outcome (PSO) for the students who are obtaining the degree under that program. PO & CO are followed as per the norms provided by university. Also we follow a structured Course Outcome (CO) for each and every course undertaken by the students in the college. In the same structure, as the outcomes are defined, the faculty members take care to assess the students according to the CO by different parameters – presentation on the topics covered, objective tests, Orals, Online-submissions and</p>

	<p>subjective assessments. Completion of each and every course is then converted into completion of Credits for the Course. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms**2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient****Response:**

Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient. There is complete transparency in the internal assessment. The criterion adopted is as directed by the university.

Ø At the beginning of the semester, faculty members inform the students about the various components in the assessment process during the semester.

Ø The internal assessment test schedules are prepared as per the university and communicated to the students well in advance.

Ø To ensure proper conduct of formative tests, two invigilators are assigned to each hall. Evaluation is done by the course handling faculty members within three days from the date of examination.

Ø The corrected answer scripts at random are verified by HOD / Program Coordinator to ensure the standard evaluation process.

Ø The corrected answer papers of the students are distributed to them for the verification by the students and any grievance is redressed immediately. The marks obtained by the students in internal assessment tests are displayed on the department notice board.

Ø The marks obtained by the students in internal assessment tests are uploaded periodically on the university web portal along with their attendance.

Ø Noting the values in observation and validating the theoretical aspects student must submit lab record regularly.

Ø Day to day performance of the students is assessed for every experiment which includes regularity, performance, viva and the promptness in submitting the record.

Ø For lab courses, the marks/grade scored by the student for each experiment is indicated in the observation/record. The independent learning, practical approach to the real-time applications is tested by viva voce for laboratory courses.

Ø For the quality of the projects, the evaluation is done by Project Review Committee along with the project guides.

Ø To ensure the transparency and curb the mal practices the university has introduced jumbling system and theory end examinations are conducted at a center other than the college.

Ø The end examination for the laboratory and projects shall be conducted with internal and external examiner appointed from the other colleges as decided by the University.

Redressal of grievances at institute level:

Ø Departmental Level: The continuous evaluation of students is carried out by faculty regarding theory lectures, labs, assignments, unit tests. The midterm marks are allotted based on defined strategies and displayed on notice board. Query if any is discussed with faculty and HOD / Program Coordinator.

Ø College Level: The Institute appoints a Senior Supervisor for smooth conduction of examinations of SPPU. If students are facing any problems, they are solved by the institution Chief Examination Officer appointed by the university. The grievances during the conduction of online/theory examinations are considered and discussed in consultation with the Principal and if necessary forwarded to the university by examination section.

Ø Redressal of grievances at University level: The queries related to results, corrections in mark sheets, other certificates issued by university are handled at SPPU examination section after forwarding such quires through the college examination section. Students are allowed to apply for reevaluation, recounting and challenged evaluation by paying necessary processing fee to university if they are not satisfied with the university evaluation through college.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 Institution frequently updates its IT facilities and provides sufficient bandwidth for internet connection

Response:

The college is a traditional institute and offers various programs affiliated to the parent university. Most of the courses have the chock and talk method for teaching the curriculum and direct the students to learn through memorization and recitation techniques. Therefore, the college has adequate IT facilities to strengthen these programs' teaching and learning processes. The computer lab is equipped with 58 computers with the latest configurations and equipped with a wide range of licensed system software, antivirus, and application software. UPS & Generator backup is there in the computer lab to ensure

uninterrupted usage of the lab. The entire computers are connected with LAN and well connected to the internet connectivity of 100 MBPS to help students and faculty members to carry out their academic and other work. Lab assistants are appointed for daily monitoring purposes. LCD projectors are available to provide effective teaching for the student. Faculty members use PowerPoint presentations, videos, etc., in the classrooms to enhance the teaching-learning process. Scanners, printers, Xerox facilities, are available, and faculty make use of this for the benefit of students. The college campus is WI-FI enabled. Faculty members can access Wi-Fi anywhere on the campus to gain additional information, carry out research activities, download information related to the curriculum, gain further knowledge about their subjects, then pass it on to the students. Students are encouraged to use IT infrastructure in the best possible way to augment their learning and hone their IT skills which is a must in today's environment. The college has installed CCTV on the campus to ensure the security and safety of people and property. The computers, peripherals, and related equipment and accessories are regularly updated and increased, replaced to meet the increasing demand of the teaching-learning process. At the beginning of the academic year, a need assessment for up-gradation and the existing infrastructure is carried out based on the suggestions from HODs / Program Coordinators and faculty members. Regular maintenance of the IT infrastructure is done at the beginning of the academic year for the deployed Software applications and UPS / Genset backup. The college has continually been reviewing the current needs, and accordingly, the internet bandwidth is upgraded from time to time.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization**6.4.1 Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)****Response:**

Institute maintains & follows a well-planned process for the mobilization of funds and resource. The process involves various committees of the institute as well as the Department Heads and Accounts office. Institute has designed some specific rules for the fund usage and resource utilization.

The HEI has a fullproof system of financial audits by internal & external audits by authorised auditors.

The institute is a self-financed institution, where the funds are generated through the fees paid by the students. The institute has other major funding resources as follows:

- Funds received from SPPU - Under SDO & Under NSS.
- Funds received from industry (collaboration & consultancy)
- The management makes up the deficit amount whenever needed for programmes of Student Welfare Association.

Grants under SDO are meant and utilized for conducting seminars, conferences and workshops, training programmes, industrial tours etc. Majority of the payments are made through cheques to ensure transparency.

Grants under NSS utilized for conducting social activities like, Swatchata Hi Sewa Campaign, NSS special camp etc. to impart social awareness among students.

Grants under Student Welfare Association utilized for conducting various programmes such as earn & learn schemes, women empowerment programmes, Nirbhay Kanyya scheme for students. Under these programme various activities are to be conducted which help to enhance the student strength, ability and personality.

The college has a yearly budget that is approved by the Principal in College Development Committee and forwarded for sanction to the Trust Board.

Internal Financial Audit:

Trust has established its own internal audit department which checks the financial accounts and suggests corrections, if required. For an internal audit, Chartered Accountant appointed by the authorities of the Management.
